

Nigeria Oil and Gas Report Q2 2016

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Abstracts

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BMI View: While there have been some notable reforms to the NNPC, there is still a long way to go in order to create a transparent and profitable company that encourages investment and helps Nigeria reach its hydrocarbon potential. Nigerian oil production will increase slightly from 2.31mn barrels per day (b/d) in 2016 to 2.52mn b/d by 2018, based on sanctioned projects.

The Main Trends And developments For Nigeria's Oil And Gas Sector

On the exploration front, the current situation is bleak. According to Baker Hughes, the rotary rig count in Nigeria for February 2016 was 6, which is nearly half the average figure for 2015 and well below the average of 15 for 2014. However, 3D seismic surveys are being conducted in the Lake Chad area with the NNPC Director Ibe Kackikwu very positive about a significant oil discovery.

We expect total petroleum consumption to increase steadily from an estimated 317, 340b/d in 2016 to about 426,200b/d by the end of our forecast period, led by the transport sector and the continued use of diesel power generators as backups to intermittent power supplies. The recent collapse of oil prices has helped facilitate the removal of subsidies on gasoline, offering relief to the fragile refining sector.

The financial vulnerability of indigenous companies to continued low oil prices has the potential to slow down Nigeria's forecasted rise in production over the next three years. The Nigerian government's incentives for indigenous companies - coupled by widespread divestments by international oil companies (IOCs) - have fuelled the prominence of smaller Nigerian producers. According



to the Nigerian National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC), these companies make up 10 percent of total production, which is equivalent to 242,000 Barrels per day at 2015 production levels.



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
